


Chart1: Change in the number of approved supervisors4

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Principal Place of Practice (PPP) is the address declared by the psychologist to be the address at which he or she is predominantly practising the profession. If the psychologist is not practising the profession or is not practising predominantly at one address the Principal Place of Practice may be the psychologist's principal place of residence.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> There were 25,634 psychologists with general registration after the close of business on 28 February 2014.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> No PPP represents psychologists who do not have an Australian Principal Place of Practice recorded on the register usually because they are currently residing overseas or who have not provided a valid PPP.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup>The Board first published national data on the number of approved supervisors in March 2012. Transition provisions for supervisors were in place for the first three years of the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme until 30 June 2013 which contributed to a spike in applications for approval as a supervisor just before new requirements for supervisors commenced on 1 July 2013.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>6</sup> Applies to secondary supervisors only; secondary supervisors do not have to hold endorsement in the same area of practice as the registrar program so they can be approved generally as a registrar program secondary supervisor for any area of practice or for specific areas of practice. Principal supervisors cannot be approved for any area of practice – they must hold the relevant area of practice endorsement.

There are three different pathways that can be undertaken by registered provisional psychologists: the 4+2 internship program, the 5+1 internship program, and higher degree programs.
